


3/10/22 — Welcome to this week's reading for pleasure newsletter. We have an exciting week ahead of us — book fair, a visiting poet and National Poetry Day.

For example, reading Harry Potter has been shown to improve children's attitudes toward stigmatized groups such as immigrants, refugees, and members of the LGBT community. 
Paper Boat, Paper Bird' by David Almond: A stunning new story from the bestselling and prize-winning David Almond, that unfolds the magic of the everyday. Mina, from the unforgettable *Skellig* and *My Name is Mina*, journeys to Japan and discovers the wonders of the world around her.
