

<u>Leila and the Blue Fox' by Kiran Milwood Hargrave:</u>

I recently read this moving and beautifully illustrated book. The Waterstone's website says: *Come with an Arctic fox on a breath-taking journey... an enthralling story from the bestselling, award-winning creators of 'Julia and the Shark'. With dazzling blue and black illustrations and presented as a deluxe hardback with tracing paper inserts, this is perfect for 9+ fans of 'The Last Bear' and 'A Wolf Called Wander'. Fox wakes, and begins to walk. She crosses ice and snow, over mountains and across frozen oceans, encountering bears and birds beneath the endless daylight of an Arctic summer, navigating a world that is vast, wild and wondrous. Meanwhile, Leila embarks on a*

journey of her own - finding her way to the mother who left her. On a breath-taking journey across the sea, Leila rediscovers herself and the mother she thought she'd lost, with help from a determined little fox. Based on the true story of an Arctic fox who walked from Norway to Canada in seventy-six days - a distance of two thousand miles. This is a compelling, emotional and beautifully illustrated story.

Quote: The American children's and young people's writer Beverly Cleary once said: 'Children should learn that reading is pleasure, not just something that teachers make you do in school.'




