





<u>Welcome!</u> World Book Day will take place on Thursday 2nd March. This year's £1.00 token books will include titles from Tom Percival, Joe Wicks, Lenny Henry and Katie & Kevin Tsang.



<u>The Yoto Carnegie Medals:</u> This year's longlists were announced over the half-term holiday. The shortlists will be published on March 17th and awards will be presented on June 21st.





<u>The Yoto Carnegie Medals:</u> Past double-winner, Katya Balen has made the cut for writing with her glowing story of a blended family learning to trust again, *The Light in Everything*. The late Marcus Sedgwick is also on the longlist with his thrilling, thought-provoking, timely novella about our connections to Earth, *Wrath*.

The illustration longlist includes Levi Pinfold for his dark and brooding depictions of the fairy tale realm in *The Worlds We Leave Behind* (also appearing on the 2023 longlist for writing), and Ruchi Mhasane for her warm and sensitive illustrations in *Dadaji's Paintbrush*.

Reading for Pleasure: In a section called 'The Evidence', The World Book Day website summarises some of the research into reading for pleasure – reminding us that it: '......is the single biggest indicator of a child's future success – more than their family circumstances, their parents' educational background or their income.' Key outcomes include: - Improvement in vocabulary in comparison to non-readers (Millenium Cohort Study); - Correlation between regularity of reading for pleasure and ability in reading - each reinforcing the other as students get older (Cremin 2019, Torppa 2020); - Better performance in subjects other than English (Millenium Cohort Study); - Reading for pleasure is one of the most important predictors of test scores at age 16, regardless of background (OECD); - There is a strong correlation between regular reading for pleasure and mental wellbeing - which is separate from other predictors (NLT 2018); - Reading improves a child's empathy skills (Oatly 2016); - Interventions developing reading for pleasure attitudes (offering book choice and time to read rather than instruction) have a greater influence on reading ability than reading lessons for older children/adults (Greenberg 2014).

The Department for Education's recent Reading Framework: Teaching the Foundations of Literacy published in July 2021 also includes a summary of the evidence on reading for pleasure and highlights how it might be put in practice in the curriculum.
