






We get things underway with 'Who Let The Gods Out' – the first of a series of four fantastic stories by former Malvern-visitor Maz Evans.





'Who Let the Gods Out': The website www.lovereading4kids.co.uk says - Oh my goodness, this is a rollicking good read from Maz Evans. 'Who Let The Gods Out' is a super, funny adventure story that will have kids reading long past their bedtime. Poor Elliot is having a very tough time. His mum is poorly, they have serious money problems, a devilishly devious interfering neighbour and school is quite simply a complete nightmare! So the last thing Elliot needs is for a conceited constellation to crash land smack, bang in the middle of his cow shed. Suddenly feisty, fearless Virgo enters his life with 'a damp, loud splat.' Together they manage to set free a dangerous and incredibly evil Daemon of Death and before long it is down to Elliot to save the world. As if he didn't have enough on his plate! This book is laugh out loud hilarious. Elliot is brave and good hearted and going through such a hard time. The Gods are hilarious, quirky, fallible and bang up to date. 'Who Let The Gods Out' is the first in a four part series – so read on to see what happens next for Elliot and his new friends.



<u>'Impossible Creatures':</u> Katherine Rundell's new book will be published on September 14th. My copy has been on pre-order for ages! Here's a taster:

A boy called Christopher is visiting his reclusive grandfather when he witnesses an avalanche of mythical creatures come tearing down the hill. This is how Christopher learns that his grandfather is the guardian of one of the ways between the non-magical world and a place called the Archipelago, a cluster of magical islands where all the creatures we tell of in myth live and breed and thrive alongside humans.


Katherine Rundell is one of my favourite authors — and her amazing 'Rooftoppers' is just the best children's book ever! In my opinion, it is an absolute must read!

<u>Recommendations:</u> My summer reading included these four fab books: 'The Ghost Ship' is the final book in Kate Mosse's Joubert Family Chronicles trilogy......the Barbary Coast — 1621 — piracy, romance and revenge: great stuff! 'Wolf Road' by Alice Roberts is a





tale of adventure and friendship set in the Stone Age. This is Professor Alice Roberts' first children's book — and it's really good. 'When Stars are Scattered' is a brilliant graphic novel by Victoria Jamieson and

Omar Mohamed. Set in the Dadaab refugee camp in Kenya, it tells the story of Somali brothers Omar and Hassan. It's really moving, with a beautiful happy ending. 'April's Garden' by Isla McGuckin and Catalina Echeverri is a touching story about a young girl coming to terms with a change in circumstances - and like 'When Stars are Scattered', it is ideal for introducing children to the lives of those who are, for whatever reason, displaced or in need of security. And Catalina Echeverri's beautiful art work is just perfect.
