It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need. 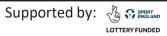

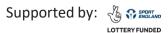

Focus on high quality gymnastics coaching for all children from Year 1-6 and CPD for staff to enable them to continue to deliver high quality sessions in the future. Develop children's technical knowledge and understanding of a key area of the national curriculum. Build children's core strength and develop motor skills to provide greater strength and flexibility. Improve staff confidence (previous discussions with staff indicated a very low confidence level across the school). Develop staff understanding of health and safety aspects and correct technique.	provide a full term of coaching for every class in the school.
