






Malvern's Reading for Pleasure Newsletter - October 2025

Turn rope turn


Not too fast, not too slow

Brian Patten: Poet and author Brian Patten died a few days ago. He was born in Bootle in 1946. Together with Roger McGough and Adrian Henri, he published *The Mersey Sound* in 1967. He wrote poems and stories for children and adults. His book *The Story Giant* is a personal favourite. Here's the start of one of his poems:

Gust Becos I Cud Not Spel......Gust becos I cud not spel / It did not mean I was daft / When the boys in school red my riting / Some of them laffed.....



A Poem for Every Question: Published in September, this funny and thought-provoking book provides answers to curious questions ... in poetry form! The book is a hilarious, non-fiction adventure in 100 poems – with subjects ranging from science and animals to unicorns, pyramids, technology and more. Questions include:

How many stars in the Universe exploded today? Who invented football? Who is the champion weightlifter of the animal world? How did the ancient Egyptians make a mummy?


Each fascinating question about the world around us is answered with one of Brian Bilston's witty poems. Expect the hilarious, thought-provoking, poignant—and downright




























Love That Dog: Written by American author Sharon Creech, this verse novel was published way back in 2001. It completely passed me by until I discovered it very recently. The Waterstone's website says: Slowly Jack learns the pleasures of writing poetry as Miss Stretchberry encourages him to tell his own story through verse. What emerges is a moving and memorable story about a boy and his dog and his growing passion for poetry.

The History of We: Told in a sequence of breathtaking paintings, Nikkolas Smith's pictorial account of the dawn of humanity centres the story

firmly in Africa and asks young readers to try and understand how it must have felt to try everything that we take for granted for the first time. Waterstone's says: What did "the beginning" look like? Let us travel back to the start, so far back that



all of our roots begin to tell the same story. The history of WE. Fossil records show that the first humans were born in Africa. Meaning every person on Earth can trace their heritage back to that continent. This is a wonderful book – a must for the artwork alone.
